State Statutes Associated with Instructional Materials

In Chapter 1006 of the Florida Statutes, District responsibilities associated with instructional materials are defined. Beginning with F.S. 1006.28, instructional materials are defined as, "materials that are available in bound, unbound, kit, or package form and may consist of hard backed or soft backed textbooks, electronic content, consumables, learning laboratories, manipulatives, electronic media, and computer courseware or software."

It is important to note that this definition exceeds what is typically referred to as "textbooks."

Funding

The purchase of instructional materials are earmarked through the use of categorical dollars that can only be spent on these types of materials. The amount of funding provided specifically for the purchase of instructional materials to the Baker County School District varies significantly each year. Both local and State factors influence how much money is appropriated by the State of Florida each year.

Funds may be used to purchase instructional materials from the Florida School Book Depository as well as from other vendors.

Under present legislation, funds may accumulate from year to year in order to facilitate the appropriate adoption of instructional materials.

State Adoptions

The State of Florida has identified an adoption cycle for the proper replacement of instructional materials. This cycle is typically a five-year period. With the adoption of new content standards or other factors, the cycle is sometimes altered to meet the educational needs of students.

Revised State Guidelines for the Adoption and Purchase of Instructional Materials

In Florida, school Districts must provide current instructional materials for the core subject areas of mathematics, language arts, social studies, science, reading, and literature. Legislation continues to provide the following:

- > Each District School Board is responsible for the content of all instructional materials used in a classroom.
- ➤ Each District School Board must adopt a policy regarding a parent's objection to his or her child's use of a specific instructional material.
- > Each District School Board must establish a process by which the parent of a public-school student may contest the District School Board's adoption of a specific instructional material.
- > Each District must provide for proper requisitioning, distribution, accounting, storage, care, and use of all instructional materials.

- Each District must provide other teaching accessories and aids as needed for the school District's educational program.
- Each District must establish and maintain a program of school library media services for all public schools.
- > The District Superintendent has the duty to recommend such plans for improving, providing, distributing, accounting for, and caring for instructional materials and other instructional aids as will result in general improvement of the District school system.
- Each District Superintendent shall notify the department by April 1 of each year the Stateadopted instructional materials that will be requisitioned for use in his or her school District.
- The school principal shall assure that instructional materials are used to provide instruction to students enrolled at the grade level or levels for which the materials are designed, pursuant to adopted District School Board rule.
- > The school principal, upon request of the parent of a student in the school, shall sell to the parent any instructional materials used in the school.
- All money collected from the sale, exchange, loss, or damage of instructional materials shall be transmitted to the District's instructional materials account.
- Principals shall see that all instructional materials are fully and properly accounted for as prescribed by adopted rules of the District School Board.

State Instructional Materials Review Process

In Florida, specific courses within selected subject areas and grade levels are called for adoption on a rotating basis, usually for a period of five years. Florida adopts instructional materials for those specific courses. Subject areas for the current adoption year and the adoption schedule are posted on the Florida Department of Education Instructional Materials website. Approximately one year prior to each adoption, the Florida Department of Education publishes the Instructional Materials Specifications for the subjects to be adopted. These specifications outline the courses, as well as the standards that the materials are expected to meet. Specifications can be downloaded from the Florida Department of Education Instructional Materials website.

State Instructional Materials Reviewers

The Commissioner of Education shall appoint three State instructional materials reviewers in the content areas submitted for adoption to review the instructional materials and evaluate the content for alignment with the applicable Next Generation Sunshine State Standards (Florida Standards). For the materials which the first two State instructional materials reviewers agree to recommend or not recommend for adoption, an evaluation by the third reviewer will not be required. An evaluation by the third reviewer will only be required for situations in which the first two reviewers disagree as to whether materials should be recommended for adoption. Instructional materials shall be made electronically available to the State instructional materials reviewers, who shall complete an electronic evaluation of the items to assess whether the materials align as Stated above.

The State instructional materials reviewers shall be State or national experts in the academic content area being reviewed for adoption. Generally, the Commissioner shall appoint State instructional materials reviewers who hold a graduate degree in the field or a related field. The Commissioner may appoint State instructional materials reviewers without a graduate degree in content areas in which a

graduate degree may not be applicable or in instances in which the reviewer has a baccalaureate degree and substantial experience and/or recognition as an expert in the field. Such recognition may include, but is not limited to, awards received or publications related to the academic content area.

District Reviewers

The Commissioner of Education shall request each school District Superintendent to nominate one classroom teacher or District-level content supervisor to review two or three of the submissions recommended by the State instructional materials reviewers. The District reviewers should be experienced teachers or supervisors with expertise in the content area. Superintendents are encouraged to nominate individuals with a graduate degree in the content area and/or who have been recognized as a Teacher of the Year at any level (School, District, Regional, State, or National). The District reviewers will evaluate only those materials recommended by the State instructional materials reviewers. District reviewers shall be provided electronic access to two or three recommended submissions and shall complete an electronic evaluation of the instructional usability of the materials.

Reviewer Training

Pursuant to Section 1006.29(4), Florida Statutes, the Department of Education developed a training program for the State instructional materials reviewers and District reviewers. Each adoption year, all State instructional materials reviewers must complete the training prior to evaluating the instructional materials. Details will be posted on the Florida Department of Education Instructional Materials website. Training includes content on the use of the online evaluation system and content directly related to the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards (Florida Standards) relevant to the current instructional materials adoption.

Evaluation of Materials

To complete the evaluation process, reviewers will receive electronic access to the following materials:

Instructional Materials Specifications - The Specifications describe the courses for which materials are being sought, as well as cite the standards that the instructional materials are expected to meet. In addition, it contains the research base that outlines the components of effective instructional materials.

Evaluation Forms - The evaluation forms are developed from the research contained in the Instructional Materials Specifications document. The Office of Instructional Materials in the Florida Department of Education will provide each reviewer access to the online evaluation instrument. Each reviewer is responsible for completing and submitting an evaluation electronically for each assigned publisher's submission on or before the deadline established by the Department. Each submission shall be evaluated at the individual benchmark level for accuracy and completeness and holistically for overall value as an instructional tool. Access the online evaluation system at https://www.flimadoption.org/.

For submissions bid as a series, such as a K-5 series, the Department may, if necessitated by the amount of content required for review, divide a submission by grade level, or another appropriate manner, for reviewers to evaluate. In such cases, the reviewers will evaluate all materials which they are assigned and the Department will establish criteria for determining whether the submission as a whole meets the requirements for recommendation.

Publishers' Evaluation Samples - The deadline for the Department to receive access to electronic or digital samples is 5:00 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time (EDT) on the first Thursday of June. Only electronic or digital sample copies of the major tool of instruction will be evaluated for adoption, except during adoptions in which ancillary materials are instrumental to the content area. For these adoptions the Department will instruct the publishers as to the number and types of ancillary materials allowable for review.

Reviewers are required to evaluate all applicable materials submitted for review in digital or electronic format. Only materials available in electronic or digital format as defined in Section 1006.29(3), Florida Statutes, will be evaluated for adoption.

After State instructional materials reviewers have reviewed the submitted materials, they will complete the electronic evaluation, which includes opportunities for reviewer comments. When the evaluation is complete the reviewer will make a recommendation of whether or not to adopt the instructional materials. Materials that have been recommended by the State instructional materials reviewers will then be made available for electronic review by the District reviewers. The District reviewers shall independently rate the recommended submissions on the instructional usability of the resources and provide an electronic evaluation to the Department. The Commissioner of Education shall review the evaluations of the State instructional materials reviewers and District reviewers, consider the costs of the materials, and then approve, reject, or amend the list of materials.

Public Review – The general public will be allowed electronic access to review instructional materials submitted for adoption. Access to the materials will be granted via the process outlined below.

- Materials which have been recommended for adoption by the State instructional materials reviewers will be made available electronically through the online evaluation system.
- > Any member of the general public wishing to view the recommended materials may register as a guest user on the Department's online evaluation system.
- > The guest user will then be notified that access to the requested materials has been granted.
- > The evaluation instrument, which allows the user to complete an online evaluation with comments, will be available for submission on reviewed materials.
- Access to the requested materials will be available via the online evaluation system for two weeks (14 calendar days).

After the two-week (14 calendar days) period has ended, access to the materials will be blocked. Any subsequent access will require an additional request to the office of instructional materials at (850) 245-0425 or via e-mail at imstaff@fldoe.org.

When all bids or proposals have been carefully considered, the Commissioner of Education shall select and adopt instructional materials from the list of suitable, usable, and desirable instructional materials recommended by the State instructional materials reviewers. Under law, due consideration is given to the prices which have been quoted and to the reports of the State instructional materials reviewers. The State reserves the right to reject any or all bids or proposals. It may also call for new bids or proposals.

Once all materials are evaluated at the State, each school district is advised of the current adoptions.

Guidelines for Instructional Materials Adoption in Baker County

The process of textbook adoption requires that stakeholders remember the following:

- Sufficient time must be allowed for the proper review and evaluation of instructional materials.
- > All administrators and teachers who will be affected by the adoption of new materials must have the opportunity to provide input in the decision-making process.
- Open communication is key to successful and timely adoption of instructional materials.

Once it has been decided that instructional materials should be adopted for a specific program or course, the school-level administrator in charge of curriculum should work in partnership with the school principal and director of teaching and learning to complete the following steps early in the adoption school year:

- 1.0 Discuss preliminary needs with the director of teaching and learning.
- 2.0 Thoroughly review the following:
 - 2.1 District School Board Policies
 - 2.1.1 4.110 Distribution of Instructional Materials Funds
 - 2.1.2 4.120 Instructional Materials Selection
 - 2.1.3 4.219 Management of Instructional Materials
 - 2.2 Florida Statutes
 - 2.2.1 1006.28 Duties of District School Board
 - 2.2.2 1006.32 Prohibited Acts
 - 2.2.3 1006.34 Standards for Selection
 - 2.2.4 1006.35 Accuracy of Instructional Materials
 - 2.2.5 1006.40 Use of Instructional Materials Allocation
- 3.0 Determine procedures and timelines to be followed.
 - 3.1 Establish parameters for an adoption committee to serve as the decision-making group for the upcoming cycle.
 - 3.1.1 Determine the composition and size of the committee so that it is large enough to provide adequate representation of those who will use the materials including:
 - 3.1.1.1 Teachers (subject, age/grade-span representatives)
 - 3.1.1.2 Lay Citizen (at least one citizen must participate)
 - 3.1.1.3 Representatives, as appropriate, from the following sub-groups:
 - 3.1.1.3.1 Non-classroom instructional staff
 - 3.1.1.3.2 School administrators
 - 3.1.1.3.3 Representatives from relevant District departments
 - 3.1.2 Ensure that each school that offers the courses using materials to be considered has an opportunity for representation.
 - 3.1.3 Review process, rubrics, provide feedback, and finalize evaluation tools.
 - 3.1.4 Review materials on State bid list.
 - 3.1.4.1 Determine if narrowing the list to be considered is needed based on number of titles included on State bid list.
 - 3.1.4.2 Determine if it is necessary to review materials in addition to those on the State bid list if they meet District standards.

- 3.1.4.3 Review statutes regarding categorical allocation and purchasing procedures.
- 3.1.4.4 Adoption committee determines selection and provides rationale for the final selection.
- 3.2 Determine processes and procedures for the committee action:
 - 3.2.1 Determine and communicate committee member selection process.
 - 3.2.2 Number of committee/subcommittee meetings needed
 - 3.2.3 Tentative dates/timelines
 - 3.2.4 Budget/inservice needs (follow instructions for budget requests under the appropriate curriculum development project or inservice component)
 - 3.2.5 Develop criteria and rubrics for evaluation of all considered materials (see sections 4.0 and 5.0).
 - 3.2.6 Determine process for capturing summary minutes or record of proceedings, including video recording of vendor presentations.
 - 3.2.6.1 Facilitator(s) are responsible for maintaining the original records of the proceedings and must provide Purchasing with copies of those records.
 - 3.2.7 Identify tool for obtaining confidential majority vote and communicate the process to Superintendent's staff.
 - 3.2.8 Identify and communicate process for providing all teachers the opportunity for input.
 - 3.2.9 Identify and communicate process for providing opportunity for public input from Baker County residents on materials under consideration and on the evaluation process.
- 3.3 Finalize adoption committee membership.
 - 3.3.1 Contact and invite committee members.
 - 3.3.2 Inform committee members of roles and responsibilities for serving.
 - 3.3.3 Obtain non-conflict of interest affidavit (Instructional Materials Committee Member Affidavit) from committee members. Members who do not sign will be disqualified.

- 12.0 Once School Board approval has been granted, the new adoption must be reported to the FDOE by April 1st per FL statute 1006.28 (2) (b), at which time the materials may be purchased according to current Purchasing guidelines.
- 13.0 A Professional Development plan for implementation of the new instructional materials must be developed.
- 14.0 If a school principal and staff determine that the District selection is inappropriate for students at their school, the principal must:

Timeline of Instructional Materials Approval Process during the Year of Adoption

 By January 24th, January 17th, the District website will contain links to digital copies of the instructional materials proposed for adoption. Student editions of recommended instructional materials will be available for viewing online by the public at least 20 calendar days before the School Board hearing and public meeting. This access must include reasonable safeguards against the unauthorized use, reproduction, and distribution of instructional materials considered for adoption.

- By February 7th, February 6th, the School Board will hold an open, noticed School Board hearing to review recommended instructional materials for adoption (no vote).
- By February 21st, the School Board will hold an open, noticed School Board hearing to receive public comment on the recommended instructional materials.
 Notice requirements for the School Board hearing and the public meeting that must specifically state which instructional materials are being reviewed and the manner in which the instructional materials can be accessed.
- By February 28th, principals will submit to the Director of Teaching and Learning a list of
 instructional materials that have been vetted and selected for adoption by their school
 site instructional materials committees.
- By March 7th, March 6th, the School Board will hold an open, noticed public meeting to approve an annual instructional material plan to identify any instructional materials that will be purchased through the School Board instructional materials review process.
- By March 21st, March 20th, the School Board will hold an open, noticed School Board hearing to adopt selected instructional materials for the next school year.
- By May 2nd, May 1st, the School Board will, if necessary, conduct an open, noticed School
 Board hearing before a Hearing Officer during the regular meeting of the Board on all
 petitions contesting the adoption of instructional materials.

The following conditions must be implemented to facilitate parent/resident participation:

- The parent/resident must file a petition, on a form provided by the School Board, within 30 calendar days after the adoption of the material by the School Board.
- b) The School Board must make the form available to the public and publish the form on the school District's website.
- c) The form must be signed by the parent, include the required contact information, and State the objection to the instructional material.
- d) The School Board's decision after convening a hearing is final and not subject to further petition or review.
- At any time, the District shall make available, upon request for public inspection, sample copies of all instructional materials that have been purchased by the District School Board.

Materials Not Adopted by the State (Flexibility Fund)

Instructional materials which are not adopted by the State can still be ordered utilizing "flexibility funds". These funds represent a portion of the total instructional materials allocation that can be used to buy materials which are not State adopted, yet approved for use within the school District. The

maximum amount that a District may spend on non-adopted materials is fifty percent of its total allocation.

Money Collected for Lost and Damaged Books

It shall be the duty and responsibility of each principal to collect from each pupil or the pupil's parent the purchase price of any instructional material the pupil has lost, destroyed, or unnecessarily damaged and to report and transmit such amounts so collected to the District's instructional materials account.

The failure to collect such sum upon reasonable effort by the principal may result in the suspension of the pupil from participation in extracurricular activities or satisfaction of the debt by the pupil through community service activities at the school site as determined by the principal.

Conservation and Care

Principals shall assure that all books issued to the school are cared for properly.

Accounting for Textbooks

Principals shall see that all books are fully and properly accounted for on forms prescribed by the State and the District instructional materials administrator.

Records and Reports

Principals shall prepare and transmit such textbook records and reports as may be required by the Department of Education and such supplementary records and reports as the Superintendent may direct.

Responsibility of Pupils, Parents, or Guardians for Instructional Materials

All materials purchased by the District are the property of the District. When distributed to students, such materials are merely on loan and are to be returned at the direction of the principal or teacher in charge. Each parent or guardian shall be held liable for any loss or destruction of, or unnecessary damage to, such materials or for failure of the pupil to return materials, and shall be required to pay for such loss, destruction, or unnecessary damage as provided by law.

Instructional Materials: Questioned Materials

When a citizen disagrees with the materials being used in the instructional program of the Baker County School District, a complaint may be registered as follows:

- 1. Complete the "Request for Review of Instructional Materials" form which is available from the principal at any school, from the District office, or the District website.
- 2. Submit the completed form to the principal of the school in which the questioned material is located or being utilized.
- 3. Principal will schedule a review within thirty school days. The review committee shall be composed of two administrators, two teachers, and two lay citizens (if possible, parents of school-aged children).

- 4. The petitioning parent or resident may attend the review committee meeting(s) as scheduled by the principal of that school. The hearing must allow the parent of a public-school student or a resident of the county to proffer evidence that a recommended instructional material does not meet the criteria provided in F.S. 1006.31(2).
- 5. If after meeting with the review committee the citizen feels dissatisfied with the results of that committee, he-she must inform the principal in writing of his/her intent to pursue a District review. The notification must be submitted within ten days.
- 6. The principal immediately forwards the written documentation and all other pertinent information to the Superintendent.
- 7. The Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee then convenes, within thirty days, a District review committee which is representative of the total school District. The review committee shall be composed of two administrators, two teachers, and four lay citizens (if possible, parents of school age children).
- 8. The District review committee will convene and report its recommendations directly to the Superintendent.
- 9. If there is still dissatisfaction with the results of the District review, the citizen may request to be on the District School Board agenda. The request should be in writing and submitted to the Superintendent within ten school days. A complainant who does not submit the written request within the deadline will receive no further consideration.
- 10. For all petitions that reach this point of appeal, the School Board will conduct an open public hearing before an unbiased and qualified hearing officer. The hearing officer may not be an employee or agent of the school district. The hearing must provide sufficient procedural protections to allow each petitioner an adequate and fair opportunity to be heard and present evidence to the hearing officer. The board's decision after convening The School Board's decision after convening a hearing is final and not subject to further petition or review.
- 11. The final decision is determined by the School Board.

When challenged materials are being reviewed, each member of the various committees established for reviewing should be familiar with the following criteria, and these criteria should be applied to the evaluation of the challenged materials.

Evaluative Criteria

- 1. Consideration should be given to the following criteria on any item that is subjected to review:
 - a. The materials are essential and appropriate for the development of the curriculum and school objectives.
 - b. The materials are factually accurate and appropriate in presentation.
 - c. The materials contribute to literary appreciation or have cultural value.
 - d. The materials are pertinent because of their content or emphasis.
 - e. The authors are competent and qualified in the field.
 - f. The materials on controversial issues represent both sides of the issue in an objective way.
 - g. Materials concerned with human growth and development and sex should be based on scientific accuracy, simplicity, dignity of presentation, and appropriateness for the age group.

- 2. Programs for academically talented and for advanced placement students have made it necessary to purchase materials that may be considered adult. This type of material should be selected on the basis of the students' needs as well as being those that will stimulate new interests in the cultural, economic, scientific, and social fields. The inclusion of particular words, phrases, and sentences should not prevent utilization of these items if they represent a major contribution to a subject field and are within the ability of the student to handle.
- 3. The following subjects have generally been topics of criticism. Evaluation criteria useful in these areas are included to provide insight into considerations that should be made when reviewing materials on these topics:
 - a. **Religion**--The material should be factual, unbiased, and representative of all major religions and should be in the materials collection.
 - b. **Ideologies**--The materials should contain basic, factual information on the appropriate level on any ideology or philosophy which exerts a strong force, either favorable or unfavorable, in government, current events, politics, education, or any phase of life.
 - c. Sex and Profanity--Materials which have an accent on sex should pass the test of literary merit and reality and be appropriate for the age level of the user. The fact that sexual incidents or profanity are included should not automatically disqualify an item. The decision to include the item in the materials collection should be made on the basis of whether it presents life in its true proportions, whether the circumstances are realistically dealt with, and whether the item is of literary value. Factual material of an educational nature on the appropriate level should be available in the materials collection.
 - d. **Science**--Medical and scientific knowledge should be made available without any biased selection of facts.
 - e. No books or other material prohibited by Florida Statutes shall be used.

Instructional Materials Selection and Adoption

Upon the recommendation of the Superintendent, the Board shall approve all District-adopted instructional materials used as part of the educational program of this District. The staff should continually research new sources and types of supplementary text materials and explore their innovative use.

Furthermore, it is the legal responsibility of the School Board to provide the duly adopted, required instructional materials to students who are enrolled in the District free of charge. For purposes of District adoption, "instructional materials" means items having intellectual content that by design serve as a major tool for assisting in the instruction of a subject or course. These items may be available in bound, unbound, kit, or package form and may consist of hard backed or soft backed textbooks, consumables, learning laboratories, manipulatives, electronic media, and computer courseware or software. The term does not include electronic or computer hardware even if such hardware is bundled with software or other electronic media, nor does it include equipment or supplies.

A student or parent(s) may purchase a copy of the duly-adopted textbook, regardless of format, for the District's purchase price, including shipping, plus ten percent (10%).

The Superintendent's designee shall develop a plan for the review and adoption of instructional material as required by law. Procedures for District adoption must require staff participation and that members of the community are consulted, where appropriate, in the adoption process.

Selection of District Instructional Materials

District committees made up of representative teachers, lay persons, and the District supervisors for the subject areas being evaluated will evaluate the State-adopted instructional materials. Sample instructional materials will be available for examination by the public and teachers.

Selection of School Instructional Materials

Items on the District instructional materials list should be selected by the school principal and his/her staff. Principals may purchase other materials determined to be necessary for their individual school if approved by the District curriculum department. When deciding items to be selected, the principal must include teachers who will be using the materials. A majority vote will determine materials to be ordered.

School Needs Assessment

Instructional materials will be ordered and used based on evaluated student needs and should be appropriate for both the guidelines of the course and the ability level of the pupils.

Once the materials are selected by a faculty, a needs assessment must be done in order for the principal to determine quantity to be ordered.

If the primary resource is a textbook, sufficient quantities should be ordered before support materials.

Disposal of Instructional Materials

- 1. The Board shall approve disposal of Instructional Materials by declaring them surplus when they have become unserviceable or surplus or are no longer on State contract by:
 - a. Giving the materials to other education programs within the District or State, to the teachers to use in developing supplementary teaching materials, to students or others, or to any charitable organization, governmental agency, or private school.
 - b. Selling the materials to used book dealers, or discarding through recycling plants, pulp mills, or other persons, firms, or corporations upon such terms as are most economically advantageous to the District.
- 2. All moneys received by reason of sale, exchange, or other disposition of instructional materials shall be deposited in the District's instructional materials account and added to the appropriation for instructional materials.

Dual Enrollment

Instructional Materials purchased by the School Board on behalf of dual enrollment students shall be the property of the Baker County School District. Instructional materials assigned for use within dual enrollment courses shall be made available to dual enrollment students free of charge. Lost or damaged dual enrollment instructional materials will be handled according to the procedures found on pages 11 and 12.

Data Analysis

What trends emerge across grade levels, subgroups and core content areas?

The overall trends across grade levels, subgroups, and core content areas reveal a substantial increase in student performance from the 2021 assessment cycle. Of the nine different grade level assessments, BCMS student performance increased in six of those areas. The average growth over all nine categories was over four percent. In addition, for the first time in many years, every student subgroup performed at or above the ESSA required forty-one percent threshold. For the first time since the inception of ESSA, there are no subgroups at BCMS identified for targeted support.

What data components, based off progress monitoring and 2022 state assessments, demonstrate the greatest need for improvement?

The ESE subgroup performed at a rate of forty-two percent. This subgroup continues to need support, particularly in reading, science, and mathematics. Eighth grade math performance on both the eighth grade FSA and Algebra I EOC is also an area of need. Another area of need is student performance on the eighth grade Statewide Science Assessment.

What were the contributing factors to this need for improvement? What new actions would need to be taken to address this need for improvement?

There are a plethora of both internal school and external societal factors that may have contributed to student performance in these areas. As an institution, the school will focus on factors within its control. The school will address individual student academic and behavioral needs to ensure both future student success and the overall improvement of the school's academic performance. The following sections of this plan will identify specific strategies that will be implemented to address these three critical areas of need.

What data components, based off progress monitoring and 2022 state assessments, showed the most improvement?

While seventh grade math showed a thirty-four percent improvement from the previous assessment cycle, this is a data anomaly and should not be considered as showing the most improvement. Sixth grade ELA (+19), sixth grade math (+7), and eighth grade social studies (+4) are three areas that showed tremendous improvement. In addition to the previously mentioned areas, the performance of the African American subgroup improved to forty-six percent (+16). This improvement represents a fifty-three percent increase in subgroup performance over the prior year's results.

What were the contributing factors to this improvement? What new actions did your school take in this area?

The implementation of the strategies outlined in the previous year's School Improvement Plan substantially impacted student performance. Instructional and administrative staff focused on addressing individual student academic and behavioral needs to ensure student success and the overall improvement of the school's academic performance.

What strategies will need to be implemented in order to accelerate learning?

As previously mentioned, the school must address individual student academic and behavioral needs to ensure future student success. The school's tier 1 core instruction must be improved in order to accelerate learning for all students. Strategies that improve the effective instruction and student mastery of the assessed standards will be implemented and evaluated as the school progresses through this academic year.

Based on the contributing factors and strategies identified to accelerate learning, describe the professional development opportunities that will be provided at the school to support teachers and leaders.

All teachers will continue to receive professional development on the MTSS process, including tier 1 instruction, and the protocols outlined in the district's MTSS Guide. Additional professional learning will be provided on both the B.E.S.T. ELA and Mathematics standards to ensure instructors have a clear understanding of the new state blue print for instruction. Other professional learning will include small-group training sessions on data analysis and the use of data to inform instruction. Professional learning time will also be used to revise curriculum maps and lesson plans to ensure instruction includes the appropriate grade-level rigor necessary for students to be successful on the new state assessments.

There are several initiatives that will be implemented this year to promote a more productive learning environment for students. The school will continue to implement the protocols and procedures outlined in the revised MTSS Guide. Students will be scheduled with teams of teachers who will be given a common planning period. Identified ESE students in seventh and eighth grade will be assigned to a learning strategies class. The support facilitation program at the school will continue to be an area of focus in order to improve the services provided to ESE students. Both administrators and teachers will use data to improve instruction and provide individual student supports. The school will continue the implementation of a schoolwide vocabulary program and the intensive reading course. Additional instructional staff will be utilized to provide intensive academic and behavioral support to students in need. The school will also use the Foundational Skills in Mathematics (Intensive Math) course to provide intensive intervention to our lowest performing math students in grades six through eight.

Data reviewed comparing the 2021 and 2022 assessment cycles showed tremendous improvement in this subject area. The percentage of students performing at levels 3, 4, or 5 increased from 42% in 2021 to 49% in 2022. Overall ELA learning gains increased from 44% in 2021 to 52% in 2022. The learning gains of the lowest 25% increased from 35% to 43%. Even with this tremendous growth, improving curriculum delivery and instructional practices in ELA remains one of the highest priorities for the current school year.

Positive Culture & Environment

A positive school culture and environment reflects: a supportive and fulfilling environment, learning conditions that meet the needs of all students, people who are sure of their roles and relationships in student learning and a culture that values trust, respect and high expectations. Consulting with various stakeholder groups is critical in formulating a statement of vision, mission, values, goals, and employing school improvement strategies that impact the school culture and environment. Stakeholder groups more proximal to the school include teachers, students and families of students, volunteers and school board members. Broad stakeholder groups include early childhood providers, community colleges and universities, social services and business partners.

Describe how the school addresses building a positive school culture and environment.

In 2020, a team of counselors, teachers, and administrators met over the course of several months to create a plan for the implementation of a homeroom period. The purpose of the homeroom, as defined by this group, is to give teachers time to cultivate a loving and nurturing relationship with a group of students that will enable them to thrive in the optimal learning environment.

For the 2022 - 2023 school year, the homeroom program began with four consecutive days of instruction. The homeroom periods were 30 minutes each of these days. Throughout the remaining weeks of the school year, homeroom will meet on Mondays for 30 minutes. The curriculum developed by the team of stakeholders will focus on three main areas: promotion of good attendance, positive behavior, and academic achievement. Other areas of focus include: cyber safety, mental health, and goal planning. The school's character education program includes lessons anchored in ten key power words and people who represent those words. These words include: respect, conduct, self-control, responsibility, reputation, persistence, maturity, forgiveness, truth, and integrity. The homeroom program is critical to the school's efforts to promote a positive school culture and healthy environment.

In addition to the homeroom program, the school has implemented a "house system" as part of our Positive Behavior and Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program. Students were randomly assigned to four houses: Delta, Omega, Sigma, and Zeta. Teachers and staff award points in a digital spreadsheet based on students exhibiting positive behavior and academic achievement. Houses are recognized at the end of each day during a schoolwide announcement. Approximately every three weeks, the house with the most points receives an award.

The principal is the lead stakeholder in promoting a positive culture and environment at the school. In addition to occasional YouTube videos encouraging students, the principal creates a quarterly digital newsletter for families. There were over 2000 views of the first newsletter in August 2022. In these newsletters, important information about the school and upcoming events is shared; however, additional items promoting a positive school culture are also included. In the coming months, students exhibiting the PBIS expectations of respect, organization, attitude, and responsibility will be highlighted in the newsletters. A similar weekly notice is sent to faculty, staff, and other internal stakeholders.

In addition to the principal, an assistant principal maintains the school website and Facebook page. These resources have been very positively received since a full makeover of the website was completed last summer. Other stakeholders who have the most tremendous impact are the teachers. The administration created a "Ways of Work" document that highlights key expectations for school staff. These expectations include positive communication with students' families. Through the use of the Remind app and other

means of contact, our teachers are daily reaching out to parents and family members with positive and informative contacts that promote a positive school culture. The school continues to encourage teachers to send out positive post cards to families including accolades about their students. Every month, a student from each team is recognized as a R.O.A.R. student of the month. These students are selected by their team of teachers as outstanding examples of our PBIS expectations of respect, organization, attitude, and responsibility. The local newspaper includes a picture of these students, and they also receive a goodie bag from the school. These intentional efforts do promote the positive culture and healthy environment that we are striving for at BCMS.

What trends emerge across grade levels, subgroups and core content areas?

The percentages of students that scored a level 3 or higher on the ELA and Math assessments were lower than those for the state. The percentages of Students With Disabilities and Black/African American students that are at a level 3 or higher was lower than the overall percentage for the school. However, the graduation rates for Students With Disabilities and Black/African American students were higher than the overall school graduation rate.

What data components, based off progress monitoring and 2022 state assessments, demonstrate the greatest need for improvement?

The Algebra 1 EOC and the FSA ELA components represent the greatest need for improvement.

What were the contributing factors to this need for improvement? What new actions would need to be taken to address this need for improvement?

The Math Department experienced significant teacher turnover. One unit was unfilled all year and another was vacated midyear and classes were redistributed to other teachers. There were also concerns that the materials were no longer adequate, since the math textbook adoption was postponed for three years until new math standards were adopted. Although there were several ELA teachers serving in new areas, we did not lose any further ground to the state. We have invested in new materials for the math department and both departments will use progress monitoring to identify needs and reteach standards that less than 60% of the students have mastered.

What data components, based off progress monitoring and 2022 state assessments, showed the most improvement?

Biology and U.S. History continue to be competitive with the rest of the state. Grade 9 was able to show growth, but remains an area of focus.

What were the contributing factors to this improvement? What new actions did your school take in this area?

Common Benchmark testing and disaggregation of data, followed by reteaching if standards are not met

What strategies will need to be implemented in order to accelerate learning?

- 1. An increase in Classroom Walkthroughs. The administration will attempt to visit every teacher's classroom each week.
- 2. All core subject area classes will administer quarterly benchmarks, meet to disaggregate data and reteach standards missed by 40% of the students.
- 3. BCHS was provided an additional Teacher on Special Assignment position and a new Graduation Coach position.

We will continue training teachers in the District's MTSS process. The Master Teacher Program is available to all BCHS instructional staff. All new teachers receive new teacher training and undergo the PDCP process. The school level new teacher training focuses on the Fundamental Five.

Math and Science after school tutoring available to all students one afternoon each week. Community visits to provide a question and answer time for families and to provide information on educational opportunities at BCHS.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE STATE OF FLORIDA, DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH BAKER COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

AND THE BAKER COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD BAKER COUNTY CAREER AND ADULT EDUCATION

The purpose of this affiliation agreement is to guide and direct a working relationship between the State of Florida, Department of Health, Baker County Health Department, hereinafter referred to as the DEPARTMENT and Baker County Career and Adult Education (Baker County School Board), an institution providing health care profession education, hereinafter referred to as the SCHOOL, for the provision of learning opportunities for health care profession students.

This is a mutual agreement between the School Board and the Clinical Site to provide students enrolled in the Baker County School District (hereinafter referred to as "School") Adult CNA and Phlebotomy Program (hereinafter referred to as "Program") supervised learning experiences in the care of patients in accordance with the provisions set forth in this agreement.

RECITALS

The SCHOOL agrees:

- 1. To provide competent faculty for the planning and implementation of instruction, teaching, guidance, supervision, and evaluation of health care profession students, and to be responsible for the education program, academic affairs, and assessment of the students.
- 2. To work in accordance with all DEPARTMENT procedures, policies, protocols, rules and regulations in carrying out the relationship described herein and in making plans for the observation of and/or practice in health care at DEPARTMENT facilities.
- 3. To provide or assure that students have the necessary, required, and appropriate books, periodicals and teaching materials for SCHOOL's educational program.
- 4. To submit to the DEPARTMENT a schedule indicating the number and names of students who will be participating in an internship under this agreement and the names of the faculty members who will be indirectly supervising students during the students' rotation at DEPARTMENT facilities.
- 5. To plan student assignments in consultation with a representative of the DEPARTMENT.
- 6. To designate a contact person for evaluation and scheduling of student rotations and facilitation of communication between the parties.
- 7. To provide direct supervision of students whenever students are at DEPARTMENT facilities or provide indirect supervision of students engaged in a mutually agreeable practicum experience with a preceptor at the DEPARTMENT. Pursuant to this Agreement, students will only be assigned to mutually agreeable practicum experiences.
- 8. To initiate and/or participate in group conferences, as requested by DEPARTMENT at mutually

agreed upon times, with a designee of the DEPARTMENT for the purpose of discussing objectives of the learning experiences and student performance in caring for patients.

- To ensure that general and professional liability insurance insuring the SCHOOL, its employees, 9. and its students who will be in training under this agreement, with limits of liability coverage in the amount of not less than Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) per claimant and Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) per occurrence, is obtained and maintained throughout the term of this agreement and any renewal thereof. It is a material term of this agreement and necessary that the SCHOOL, its employees, and its students who will be participating under this agreement are covered under a general and professional liability policy with the abovementioned limits. However, it is not necessary that the SCHOOL, its employees, and its students who will be participating under this agreement are all covered under the same policy. As evidence of such coverage, the SCHOOL shall furnish to the DEPARTMENT applicable certificates of insurance sufficient to demonstrate full satisfaction of the requirements of this paragraph prior to students beginning their internship under this agreement and annually thereafter. SCHOOL shall immediately inform DEPARTMENT of any lapses or changes to coverages that would bring SCHOOL out of compliance with this paragraph. Failure of the SCHOOL to ensure that such coverage is obtained and maintained shall be grounds for immediate termination of this agreement. If the SCHOOL is a public college or university in Florida, the SCHOOL may be self-insured through the State Risk Management Trust Fund, established pursuant to section 284.30, Florida Statutes, and administered by the State of Florida, Department of Financial Services, or may be otherwise insured pursuant to the provisions of section 1004.24, Florida Statutes.
- 10. To be fully responsible for its acts of negligence, or its agents'/students' acts of negligence when acting within the scope of their employment, education or agency, and agrees to be liable for any damages resulting from said negligence.
- 11. Unless SCHOOL is a state agency or subdivision under section 768.28, Florida Statutes, or otherwise protected by sovereign immunity under its respective state law, to be liable for and indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the DEPARTMENT and all of its officers, agents, and employees from all claims, suits, judgments, or damages, consequential or otherwise and including attorneys' fees and costs, arising out of any act, actions, neglect, or omissions by the SCHOOL, its agents, students, or employees during the performance or operation of this Agreement or any subsequent modifications thereof, whether direct or indirect, and whether to any person or tangible or intangible property. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any school to whom sovereign immunity may be applicable nor consent by a state agency or political subdivision of the State of Florida to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of any contract.
- 12. To assure that students maintain confidentiality of all data, files, and client records related to the services provided pursuant to this agreement and comply with state and federal laws, including, but not limited to, section 456.057, Florida Statutes, and 45 Code of Federal Regulations Parts 160, 162 and 164. The SCHOOL will take steps to assure students' compliance with any applicable professional standards of practice with respect to patient confidentiality. Procedures will be implemented by the SCHOOL to require students to comply with the protection and confidentiality requirements outlined in the Department of Health Information Security Policies, Protocols, and Procedures, as amended, and Privacy Rule of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA), which are incorporated herein by reference. The SCHOOL assures that students have been trained in all aspects of ethical standards pertaining to confidentiality issues and privacy rights including federal Privacy Rules and applicable state confidentiality laws. Solely for the purpose of defining students' roles in relation to the use and disclosure of the DEPARTMENT'S protected health information, the students are defined as

members of the DEPARTMENT'S workforce, as that term is defined by 45 CFR 160.103, when engaged in activities pursuant to this agreement. However, students are not and shall not be considered employees of the DEPARTMENT. This paragraph is not applicable to any students who do not access any confidential information.

Statutes, including all public records required by the DEPARTMENT to perform the services entailed in this agreement, and to provide the public with access to such public records on the same terms and conditions that the DEPARTMENT would provide the records and at a cost that does not exceed that provided in Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, or as otherwise provided by law; to ensure that public records that are exempt or that are confidential and exempt from public record requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the term of the agreement, including all renewals, and following completion of the agreement if SCHOOL does not transfer the records to DEPARTMENT; to meet all requirements for retaining public records as set forth in law and DEPARTMENT's retention schedules; and, upon completion of the contract, to transfer to the DEPARTMENT, at no cost to DEPARTMENT, all public records in possession of the SCHOOL and to destroy any duplicate public records stored electronically must be provided to the DEPARTMENT in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of the DEPARTMENT.

If the SCHOOL has questions regarding the application of Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, to the SCHOOL's duty to provide public records relating to this contract, contact the custodian of public records at (850)245-4005, PublicRecordsRequest@flhealth.gov or 4052 Bald Cypress Way, Bin A02, Tallahassee, FL 32399.

To assure that all students are background screened and meet the Level 2 screening requirements of section 435.04, Florida Statutes, prior to students beginning their internship at the DEPARTMENT. The SCHOOL agrees to take steps to assure that students, and any SCHOOL personnel that accompany students or have access to DEPARTMENT's confidential records, inform the DEPARTMENT's designated contact person immediately if an arrest is made or a court disposition is entered for any disqualifying offense while participating in this internship. The DEPARTMENT will immediately remove the student from the internship program, or the personnel from further involvement in the program or access to records, if DEPARTMENT determines, in its sole discretion, that continued involvement of that student or personnel would violate the requirements of section 435.04, Florida Statutes, or would otherwise pose a risk to health or safety of any individual(s) or the public. The DEPARTMENT shall not be responsible for any costs associated with this paragraph.

The DEPARTMENT agrees:

- 1. To provide health care profession students accepted into this internship program access to a planned supervised program of internship experience for the area(s) of practice/study mutually agreed upon by the parties.
- 2. To provide designated staff members as internship supervisors for students, but such supervisors will not substitute for or diminish the requirement that SCHOOL provide faculty supervision as set forth above.

- 3. To designate a contact person for evaluation and scheduling of student rotations and facilitation of communication between the parties.
- 4. To make available to the faculty and students of the SCHOOL the DEPARTMENT facilities as agreed upon by both designated contact persons.
- 5. To retain overall responsibility for the quantity and quality of patient care in DEPARTMENT facilities.
- 6. To give SCHOOL five days' notice prior to removing from the internship program any students not comporting themselves in accordance with the procedures, protocols, regulations, rules, or statutes governing the DEPARTMENT unless DEPARTMENT deems immediate removal necessary, which such removal and determination of immediate necessity shall be at the sole discretion of the DEPARTMENT.
- 7. To provide as available the physical facilities, equipment, supplies, and patients to supplement an educational program in accordance with the objective of providing an internship experience to health care profession students. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the DEPARTMENT may, at its discretion, temporarily remove access to facilities, equipment, supplies, and patients in the interest of the health or safety of patients, employees, students, or other interns.
- 8. The DEPARTMENT, a state agency or subdivision, is self-insured through the State Risk Management Trust Fund, established pursuant to section 284.30, Florida Statutes, and administered by the State of Florida, Department of Financial Services. The DEPARTMENT certifies that it maintains, and agrees to continue to maintain during the term of this agreement, general and professional liability protection coverage through the State Risk Management Trust Fund, and that this protection extends to the Department of Health, its officers, employees, and agents, and covers statutory liability exposure to the limitations described in section 768.28, Florida Statutes. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any party to whom sovereign immunity may be applicable. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by a state agency or subdivision of the State of Florida to be sued by third parties. The DEPARTMENT cannot insure or indemnify the SCHOOL, its officers, employees, students, and agents, or any third parties.

General Terms.

- 1. Independent Contractor. No relationship of employer/employee, principal/agent, or other association shall be created by this agreement between the parties or their directors, officers, agents, students or employees. Students shall, at all times, be considered "independent" and shall, under no circumstances, be considered employees of the DEPARTMENT. The parties agree that they will never act or represent that they are acting as an agent of the other or incur any obligations on the part of the other party.
- 2. Remedies; Limitations of Liability. Except for willful misconduct or gross negligence, neither party shall be liable to the other for punitive, exemplary, special, indirect, or consequential damages, including without limitation, lost profits, each party's aggregate liability being limited to the other party's direct damages, and other costs set forth herein. This paragraph may only be interpreted as further limitation of the DEPARTMENT'S exposure; it shall not be interpreted as a waiver of sovereign immunity beyond that stated in section 768.28, Florida Statutes. In addition to the foregoing, the DEPARTMENT shall not be liable to students, faculty, or SCHOOL in the event of exposure to an

infectious, environmental, occupational, or other hazard not caused by the willful or negligent conduct of the DEPARTMENT.

Notice. When either party to this Agreement desires to give notice to the other, such notice must be in writing, and delivered by (i) United States certified or registered mail, postage prepaid and return receipt requested, (ii) a nationally recognized overnight delivery service, (iii) personal delivery with a written receipt obtained, or (iv) email transmission with confirmation of receipt provided by the recipient via returned email, at the addresses set forth below. Notices shall be effective upon receipt. Presently, the parties designate the following as the respective places for giving notice:

- 4. Term and Renewal. Unless terminated earlier as provided herein, the term of this agreement shall be from Nov 1st, 2022 or the latest date of signature by the parties, whichever is later, through September 30, 2025. This agreement may be renewed on a yearly basis for no more than three years or the term of the original contract, whichever period is longer. Any renewal shall be in writing upon mutual agreement and subject to the same terms and conditions as set forth in this initial agreement.
- 5. Termination. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon no less than 30 calendar days' notice in writing to the other party, with or without cause, unless a lesser time is mutually agreed upon in writing by both parties. Such notice shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, or in person with proof of delivery. The parties will thereafter work cooperatively to coordinate the termination of the services provided under this agreement.
- 6. Entire Agreement and Modification. This agreement represents the entire understanding of the parties with respect to the matters covered herein and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements, representations, and discussion, whether oral or written. This agreement may only be altered, amended, or modified in a writing signed by both parties.
- 7. Jurisdiction and Venue. This agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida, without respect to its conflict of laws principles. With respect to any action arising out of this agreement, the parties accept the exclusive jurisdiction of the state courts in

Florida and agree that venue shall lie exclusively in Baker County, Florida.

- 8. Capacity: Each individual signing this agreement on behalf of either party individually warrants that he or she has the full legal power to execute this agreement on behalf of the party for whom he or she is signing and to bind and obligate such party with respect to all provisions contained in this agreement.
- 9. Counterparts: This agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same document.
- 10. Cooperation with the Inspector General: SCHOOL acknowledges and understands that it has a duty to and will cooperate with the Inspector General in any investigation, audit, inspection, review, or hearing, pursuant to section 20.055(5), Florida Statutes.

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into and effective on the date of final execution (herein the "Effective Date") and between The Baker County School District, a school DISTRICT within the State of Florida (hereinafter referred to as the DISTRICT), and Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, a not-for-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Florida (hereinafter referred to as ERAU), to conduct work of mutual interest, which will be identified in a Statement of Work and Budget and Additional Terms and Conditions attached hereto and identified as Attachments A and B, respectively.

ERAU and the **DISTRICT** shall be referred to individually as "Party" and collectively as "Parties".

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to contract with one another to provide for the addition or continuation of Embry Riddle – Gaetz Aerospace Institute (hereinafter referred to as GAI).

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises herein made, it is agreed between the Parties hereto as follows:

ARTICLE 1.0 SCOPE OF SERVICES

Confidential Information would include cost and budget information, courseware, insights into future plans by either Party, or other information that would expand the financial accountability of either Party beyond that required by the law and its internal procedures, or that would reveal that information to the public media, competitors, and/or other school DISTRICTs negotiating similar programs with ERAU. Subject to and only to the extent permitted by Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, any Party receiving Confidential Information shall hold such information in strictest confidence, shall not transfer by any means the said information to any third Parties without prior written consent of the disclosing Party, and shall not use or reproduce the said information for any purpose other than as reasonably required for the performance of the Agreement.
- 6.2 Subject to and only to the extent permitted by Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, each Party hereto shall at all times take all reasonable precautions which are necessary, useful, or desirable in order to prevent the disclosure or unauthorized use of Confidential Information of the other Party, and shall allow access to and disclosure of such information only to those of its employees as is specifically required for the purpose for which it is provided, and shall take responsible steps to ensure that all such employees are made aware of and comply with the receiving Party's obligations hereunder.
- 6.3 The foregoing obligations of confidentiality, use, and non-disclosure shall not apply to any information provided by the disclosing Party to the extent that the receiving Party can prove that:
 - 6.3.1 Such information has been developed independently by one Party and was lawfully in its possession prior to the receipt thereof,
 - 6.3.2 Such information lawfully is or became public knowledge through no breach of this Agreement by the receiving Party;
 - 6.3.3 Such information is lawfully provided to the receiving Party without restriction by a third Party; or
 - 6.3.4 Such information is required to be disclosed by law.
- 6.4 The parties recognize that DISTRICT is a governmental entity, subject to Florida law regarding public access to records under Florida Statute, Chapter 119. As such, the Parties agree that only such information as is exempt and confidential under the provisions of law shall be considered confidential under the Terms of this Agreement. To the extent ERAU provides DISTRICT any information which it believes is confidential or exempt, ERAU shall notify DISTRICT of the specific information that it believes is confidential, as well as

the basis for the exemption. To the extent that ERAU maintains information, which is subject to public record request, it shall provide the public access to such records in accordance with, and subject to the applicable statutory terms and fees. Pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, ERAU may receive from the DISTRICT records that may be exempt from public release, including but not limited to, personally identifiable student information, the confidentiality of which is protected under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act as well as under Sections 1002,22 and 1002,221, Florida Statutes. ERAU acknowledges and agrees that it may use such information only for the purposes for which the disclosure was made and may not disclose the information to any other party without the prior written consent of the DISTRICT. ERAU shall not allow anyone to obtain access to personally identifiable information from education records, or other exempt records, except in strict accordance with the requirements, if any, established by the DISTRICT in writing. Upon termination of the Agreement, ERAU shall, at the election of the DISTRICT, either destroy or return to the DISTRICT, all such information in its possession, if any, and confirm the same in writing to the DISTRICT. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained in this Agreement, ERAU shall indemnify and hold the DISTRICT and its officers and employees harmless for any violation of this covenant, including but not limited to defending the DISTRICT and its officers and employees against any complaint, administrative or judicial proceeding, payment of any penalty imposed upon the DISTRICT, or payment of any and all cost(s), damage(s), judgment(s), or loss(es) incurred by or imposed upon the DISTRICT arising out of the breach of this covenant by ERAU. This provision shall survive the termination of or completion of all performance or obligations under this Agreement and shall be fully binding upon ERAU until such time as any proceeding brought on account of this covenant is barred by any applicable statute of limitations.

ARTICLE 7.0 LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

The Parties agree to be fully responsible for their own acts of negligence, or their respective agents' acts of negligence when acting within the scope of their employment and agree to be liable for any damages proximately caused thereby; provided, however, the Parties agree that DISTRICT's liability is subject to the monetary limitations and defenses imposed by Section 768.28, Florida Statutes. These limitations will apply for all claims, including without limitation, contract, warranty, indemnity, tort (including derelict and negligence), and strict liability howsoever caused or incurred for any reason whatsoever. Nothing in this Agreement shall waive the sovereign immunity of the DISTRICT except to the extent waived in Section 768.28, Florida Statutes.

ARTICLE 8.0 NOTICES

8.1 No notice or communication pertaining to this Agreement, except as provided in Paragraph 3 herein, shall be deemed to have been duly given by the Parties, unless addressed as follows or to such other address, individual or telecopy number as may be designated by notice given by a Party to the other Party

8.2 Any such notice, request, requirement, approval, permission, consent or other communication in connection with this Agreement shall be given in writing and, if delivered by hand shall have been so delivered, or by registered mail shall be deemed to have been received by the addressee on the day on which it shall have been received, or if faxed, shall be deemed to have been received by the addressee upon electronic acknowledgement.

ARTICLE 9.0 RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES

The Parties hereto shall act as independent contractors and nothing herein contained shall be construed as creating any other relationship between the DISTRICT and ERAU, nor shall it be construed as creating any relationship with the other Party's employees. Each Party agrees that none of its employees is an employee or agent of the other Party. No Party hereto shall, without the prior written consent of the other Party, enter into any contract or commitment in the name of or on behalf of the other Party or bind the other Party in any manner whatsoever.

ARTICLE 10.0 COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

- 10.1 The Parties shall comply with any laws, rules, and regulations in force in the location where the Program is performed, as well as codes of conduct, if any, concerning security and safety of its employees or representatives.
- 10.2 At all times relevant hereto, ERAU shall maintain all appropriate occupational and professional licenses as necessary to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement.

ARTICLE 11.0 STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

The Parties recognize that the standards of deportment and conduct for faculty and students in the GAI must be appropriate to the requirements of a professional education program and the Federal, State, and local laws applicable to public education in the DISTRICT. The Parties further agree that the more stringent of the standards of deportment and conduct established for GAI in general and in the ERAU Student Honor Code available at https://daytonabeach.erau.edu/campus-life/dean-of-students/honor will govern behaviors in the GAI.

ARTICLE 12.0 DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- 12.1 The Parties agree that any disputes between them arising from, related to, or in connection with this Agreement or the facts and circumstances leading thereto shall be exclusively subject to the laws, jurisdiction and venue of the United States of America, State of Florida, without regard to otherwise applicable choice of law provisions.
- 12.2 In case of dispute that cannot be resolved by mutual agreement, the Parties agree to good faith efforts to resolve any disputes between them by means of mediation using a mutually agreed mediator. Each side shall bear its own costs and expenses. Nothing about this provision shall bar either Party from seeking appropriate injunctive relief in Florida courts to prevent an imminent, irreparable harm.

ARTICLE 13.0 INDEMNIFICATION

As provided for under common law, and to the extent specifically authorized by Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, each of the Parties to this Agreement hereby agrees to indemnify and hold the other Party hereto harmless from and against all damages of any nature whatsoever which are caused or materially contributed to by the negligent acts of any officer, employee, and agent or other representative of the indemnifying Party and which are not caused or materially contributed to by any officer, employee, agent or other representative of the indemnified Party. In no event shall either Party be liable to the other under any theory of tort, contract, strict liability or other legal or equitable theory for lost profits, exemplary, punitive, special, incidental, indirect, consequential, collateral or similar damages, each of which is hereby excluded by agreement of the Parties regardless of whether or not such Party has been advised of the possibility of such damages.

FAA ground courses may be offered but no actual flight activities or flight training in an aircraft are part of the ERAU Concurrent Enrollment program and any local third-party business or individual offering flight training is doing so without any connection or relationship to ERAU.

ARTICLE 14.0 FORCE MAJEURE

No Party shall be liable for any failure to perform its obligations in connection with any action described in this Agreement, if such failure results from any act of God, riot, war, civil unrest, flood, earthquake, or other cause beyond such Party's

reasonable control (including any mechanical, electronic, or communications failure, but excluding failure caused by a Party's financial condition or negligence). Except as expressly provided otherwise in Agreement, dates and times by which any Party is required to perform and obligations under this Agreement and the Statement of Work shall be postponed automatically to the extent and for the period of time that such Party is prevented from meeting such obligation by reason of any cause beyond its reasonable control, provided the Party prevented from performing its obligations notifies the other Party immediately of the commencement and nature of such cause and the probable consequences thereof with appropriate details, and provides further that such Party will use reasonable efforts to comply with its obligations in a timely manner utilizing to such end all resources reasonably required in the circumstances, including obtaining supplies or services from other sources if same are available.

ARTICLE 15.0 CONFIDENTIALITY OF AGREEMENT/PUBLICITY

Subject to and only to the extent permitted by Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, the Parties shall secure each other's prior written approval before any information relating to this Agreement is released to anyone other than employees of any of the Parties requiring the information for the performance of their duties with respect to the matters contemplated in this Agreement, and which have agreed to be bound by confidentiality undertakings.

ARTICLE 16.0 ASSIGNMENT

The Parties acknowledge that this Agreement has been entered in consideration of the Parties mutual confidence in each other and the Parties are unwilling to proceed on the basis set out in this Agreement with any other person save and except as expressly provided herein. Consequently, neither this Agreement nor any of the respective rights or obligations of the Parties hereunder or benefit or advantage received, may be assigned, given, sold, bargained sublet, or otherwise disposed of, in whole or in part, by either Party without the prior written consent of the other Party, which shall not be unreasonably withheld or unduly delayed.

ARTICLE 17.0 COMPLETE AGREEMENT

- 17.1 This Agreement supersedes all previous agreements between the Parties related to the subject matter hereof and represents the entire understanding between the DISTRICT and ERAU in relation to the subject matter dealt with herein.
- 17.2 This Agreement shall not be amended or modified, and no waiver of any provision shall be effective, unless set forth in a written instrument authorized and executed with the same formality as this Agreement.

ARTICLE 18.0 INSURANCE

District certifies that it is self-insured pursuant to the provisions of §768.28, Florida Statutes, for tort liability in anticipation of any claim which it might be liable to pay pursuant to that section. Worker's compensation coverage is also self-insured at levels conforming to statutory requirements. Such liability and workers' compensation self-insurance supersedes any insurance obligation imposed on the

District in the Agreement. District shall insure that ERAU receives immediate notification of reduction in or cancellation of coverage.

ERAU agrees to maintain insurance coverage.

ARTICLE 19.0 FLORIDA STATUTE 1011.62 (1)(O)

An amendment to s. 1011.62(1)(o), F.S., added provisions to allow for funding of CAPE Industry Certifications and CAPE Acceleration Industry Certifications earned through dual enrollment. CAPE industry certifications earned through dual enrollment must be reported and funded pursuant to s. 1011.80, F.S. However, if a student earns a certification through a dual enrollment course and the certification is not a fundable certification on the postsecondary certification funding list, or the dual enrollment certification is earned as a result of an agreement between a school district and a nonpublic postsecondary institution, such as this, the bonus value shall be funded in the same manner as other nondual enrollment course industry certifications. In such cases, the school district may provide for an agreement between the high school and the technical center, or the school district and the postsecondary institution may enter into an agreement for equitable distribution of the bonus funds.

Several ERAU courses have Industry Certification preparation embedded in their course work.

For the purposes of this Agreement, if dual enrollment certification is earned on ERAU courses with CAPE certifications, the equitable distribution of funds is set at 5% to ERAU for this annual agreement. Each year's percentage will be dictated based on the availability of state grant dollars. Districts are encouraged to utilize Industry Certifications as a means for future sustainability.

<u>Districts are required to register courses associated with CAPE certifications with</u> the department of education for CAPE funding.

All costs associated with CAPE Certifications (course materials, testing fees and equipment) are covered within this agreement by ERAU and subject to available funds.

Attachment B

Additional Terms and Conditions

Purpose

Concurrent/dual enrollment courses are postsecondary courses that eligible students can take to earn both secondary and college or career certificate credit facilitating accelerated progress toward a post-secondary certificate or degree. The Gaetz Aerospace Institute (GAI) of Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University (ERAU), Contract Committee meets annually in the spring to go over the current year's agreements and discusses changes that are required due to changes in statute or rule and any changes desired by either the school district or the college. A draft document is prepared by University personnel and sent to all members of the Committee for additional changes or approval. Once the document is in its final draft, copies are sent to the school districts to take to their School Boards for approval and signatures. Once approved and signed, copies are sent to Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University (ERAU) to be approved and signed by GAI—ERAU. Digitally signed, electronic copies are sent to the school district personnel unless hard copies are requested.

The Agreement is expected to be completed prior to the start of the school year.

A. A ratification or modification of all existing agreements

Once the Agreement is signed by both Parties, the Agreement will be active for the upcoming academic year. This Agreement covers **concurrent/dual enrollment**, but also course work to support career pathways, outreach and teacher preparation. Legislative changes that occur after the final draft of this document which impact the upcoming academic year will take precedence.

B. A description of the process by which students and their parents are informed about opportunities for student participation in the concurrent/dual enrollment program

It is the responsibility of the high schools in the district to inform students of the

availability of the dual enrollment program requirements and currently offered courses through educational planning and guidance process. Each high school will advertise dual enrollment through a variety of methods. High school personnel will direct students to meet with their high school guidance counselors if they are interested in learning more about participation in dual enrollment. High school guidance counselors will review with the student criteria for participation in the dual enrollment program. Information will also be available to students and parents on ERAU's Gaetz Aerospace Institute website. It is the responsibility of the high schools to notify parents about the option for their child to participate in dual enrollment courses through a variety of means.

- 1. References to students in this document mean any student enrolled in a GAI ERAU course.
- 2. Registration in this document refers to the period of time between applying and enrolling in their dual enrollment courses each semester.
- 3. References to applying or applications means the process by which the student completes the online application, enters the information required, and submits the parent consent form. This process is completed upon entry to the program and is only required to be completed once.
- 4. GAI will provide information to the secondary schools regarding requirements for participation in, and the educational benefits to be derived from concurrent/dual enrollment.
- 5. The secondary schools, in turn, will utilize printed, published, electronic, or other media to notify students and their parents or guardians of the opportunity to participate in these programs. The secondary schools will additionally provide information, using these same methods, to students and their parents or guardians, of the eligibility criteria for participation in these programs.
- 6. GAI will post application deadlines and registration dates on its concurrent/dual enrollment website https://erau.edu/gaetz-aerospace-institute/students-instructors/important-dates.
- 7. GAI's Regional Managers, Faculty and staff will work with district and school officials on targeted concurrent/dual enrollment recruiting activities.
- C. A delineation of courses and programs available to students eligible to participate in concurrent/dual enrollment, outreach and career pathway courses.
 - Courses to be provided by GAI under this Agreement will be mutually agreed upon by GAI and the School District and will avoid unnecessary duplication of existing courses.

- 2. Section 1007.271(1), Florida Statutes, establishes that "the dual enrollment program is the enrollment of an eligible secondary student ... in a postsecondary course creditable toward high school completion and a career certificate or an associate or baccalaureate degree". A student who is enrolled in postsecondary instruction that is not creditable toward a high school diploma may not be classified as a dual enrollment student. Physical education skills courses and college preparatory instruction are not eligible for dual enrollment.
- 3. GAI will furnish each school with a copy of the current courses with descriptions for each course in which a student may be enrolled. Specific courses to be provided on school campuses in the participating districts shall be mutually agreed upon by the School Board and GAI.
 - Dual enrollment: https://erau.edu/gaetz-aerospace-institute/programs/concurrent-dual-enrollment
 - High school credit courses: https://erau.edu/gaetz-aerospace-institute/programs/smarter-high-school
- 4. Courses eligible for dual enrollment must be a minimum of three college credits; courses with two or more college credits with a 1.0 or more credit lab are acceptable. If there are co-requisite courses required by ERAU, the courses must be taken simultaneously.
- 5. GAI courses, both dual enrollment and SMART@ER courses, <u>have a cap of</u> no more than 30 students per section (class period). Dual enrollment courses may not be combined with other courses. All students in the dual enrollment classroom must be enrolled with ERAU.
- D. A description of the process by which students and their parents exercise options to participate in the concurrent/dual enrollment program

Students and the parent/guardian of students wishing to pursue participation in the GAI program must contact their secondary school guidance counselors to discuss admissions criteria and to obtain the necessary application information.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Step 1 – Complete Online Application – New Students Only – First 10 Days of Semester All new students (students who have not taken an ERAU class previously) must complete the online application. Special care should be taken to enter information correctly as this will create the official ERAU student account. Applications are typically processed within a few business days. The online application link can be found on the GAI website at https://erau.edu/gaetz-

aerospace-institute/students-instructors.

Once the application is processed at ERAU, the student will receive an email with their Embry-Riddle Student ID number and email address. The student must log on to ERNIE to claim their account and set up their password. To access ERNIE, go to www.erau.edu and click on ERNIE at the top of the page.

Step 2 — Complete Consent Form — New Students Only — First 10 Days of Semester All new students (students who have not taken an ERAU class previously) must submit a Consent Form, complete with their ERAU student ID#, and both parent/guardian and guidance counselor signatures. The Consent Form must be submitted to ERAU for the student to be eligible to enroll in courses.

Step 3 – Enrolling in Courses – ALL STUDENTS

Instructors will supply their students with the correct Course Code and Section Number for the class during the Registration period and instructions for enrolling. Students will self enroll in their courses online each semester by accessing their ERNIE accounts.

The school is responsible for providing any documents needed for eligibility. This may include secondary school transcripts or placement test scores.

All documentation must be received by ERAU by the posted deadlines. If a student does not meet eligibility criteria or does not submit paperwork by the posted deadline, they may not be eligible to enroll.

1. **Registration** - GAI brochures will be provided to guidance counselors by ERAU to better help students and parents understand the requirements, admission, enrollment, procedures, and benefits of program participation. The registration process is also housed on the GAI website: https://erau.edu/gaetz-aerospace-institute/students-instructors.

Instructors will supply their students with the correct course and section number during open registration and students will self-register online. Students should verify their enrollments by logging in to their ERNIE accounts and reviewing their student center records. Students are held to the GAI academic calendar and deadlines. Any schedule changes must be made by the published deadlines. It is the student's responsibility to notify ERAU's GAI office if they change schools or withdraw from secondary school.

2. Withdrawal process – dual enrollment students must notify their teacher and guidance counselor to withdraw from a course(s) within the withdrawal period. The student must see their guidance counselor to request a withdrawal. The guidance counselor will email ERAU at bosmat@erau.edu of the effective date of the student's schedule change. Requests must be received by the withdrawal deadline. The student will receive a W on their transcript for the attempt in the

course. Students who withdraw two times are no longer eligible to participate in the ERAU-GAI program.

Regardless of meeting student eligibility requirements for continued enrollment, a student may lose the opportunity to participate in a course if the student is disruptive to the learning process such that the progress of other students or the efficient administration of the course is hindered.

In addition, a student will be sanctioned accordingly if found to violate any of the ERAU student code of conduct standards as outlined in the ERAU Student Handbook. This could include a sanction ranging from a warning to permanent dismissal from ERAU. https://erau.edu/gaetz-aerospace-institute/students-instructors/academic-integrity-student-handbook

Each course taken through concurrent/dual enrollment will count toward the student's total attempted hours once they graduate secondary school. If the student takes unnecessary course work, it could impact Federal Financial Aid and university excess hour fees in the future. It is the responsibility of school guidance counselors to share this information with parents.

3. Grade Distribution - All students enrolled in concurrent/dual enrollment classes will be graded on the same basis as other college students in the same courses. GAI will assign letter grades to each student/course and the letter grade assigned shall be posted to the student's secondary school transcript by the school district. Final grades between the university course and high school course must match.

E. A list of any additional initial student eligibility requirements for participation in the concurrent/dual enrollment program

- 1. An overall GPA of 2.5 on an unweighted 4.0 scale is required for students to enroll in dual enrollment. Students must be in grades 10-12 to enroll in dual enrollment courses. Continued eligibility for college credit dual enrollment (concurrent/dual enrollment) requires the maintenance of a 2.0 unweighted secondary school GPA and the minimum GPA required by the college. S. 1007.271(3), F.S., allows exceptions to the required GPA on an individual student basis if both parties agree. Broad exceptions are not allowed. Any exception to these requirements must be approved in advance by ERAU and the secondary school Administration.
- 2. The secondary schools shall identify those students qualified and interested in participation of concurrent/dual enrollment classes. The secondary school administrators will approve student eligibility for participation in these classes. The student must be enrolled in their County Public School System or Private School Organization and must be working towards a secondary school diploma to participate in concurrent/dual enrollment.

- 3. Parent/Guardian signature is required on the consent form.
- 4. Concurrent/dual enrollment courses are weighted at least at the honors level on the secondary school transcripts. Any course taken becomes a permanent part of the student's academic record. Students will earn secondary school and college credit for the course dual enrollment (concurrent enrollment). If a student does not successfully complete their course(s) it could affect future financial aid eligibility.
- 5. The district and participating school are held to the GAI academic calendar and deadlines. Any schedule changes must be made by the published deadlines. Efforts are made to align the GAI academic calendar as closely as possible with the high school's but discrepancies may occur with course dates, testing and grading deadlines. It is the student and school's responsibility to notify the GAI office if they change schools or withdraw from a secondary school.
- 6. Students who earn an "F" grade in a course are no longer eligible to enroll in GAI courses.
- 7. Students who earn a "D" grade may retake that one class. Courses may only be repeated once.
- 8. Dual enrollment courses meet the curricular expectations and are at the same depth and rigor of non-dual enrollment postsecondary instruction, including dual enrollment courses offered on the high school campus. Students should understand that dual enrollment courses are college courses and the amount of work necessary to succeed may be much greater than in high school courses. In addition, dual enrollment courses become a part of a student's permanent college transcript and are calculated into the student's permanent postsecondary GPA. It is the responsibility of the high schools in the district to inform the students and parents about the college-level expectations.
- 9. Students must be labeled as at least a sophomore in secondary school for consideration for concurrent/dual enrollment courses. Students are no longer eligible for concurrent/dual enrollment once they successfully complete 4 years of enrollment in secondary school or graduation, whichever comes first. Any exceptions to the requirements must be approved by both the secondary school and GAI.
- 10. Students who will graduate from secondary school prior to completion of the post-secondary course may not register for the course through concurrent/dual enrollment. This means that secondary school seniors may NOT take a Summer A course as concurrent/dual enrollment or as a regular college student since they have not officially graduated from secondary

school prior to the start of that term.

F. A delineation of the secondary school credit earned for the passage of each concurrent/dual enrollment course

1. The school district will ensure that appropriate secondary school credit will be awarded upon successful completion of concurrent/dual enrollment classes. The district and school administration are responsible for registering their career themed courses with the Department of Education if the dual enrollment course is tied to an Industry Certification approved under CAPE.

G. A recommended procedure for informing students and their parents of collegelevel course expectations

- 1. GAI will supply secondary school guidance counselors with concurrent/dual enrollment brochures which include application instructions to inform students/parents of the requirements and benefits of participation in the program.
- 2. Instructors will remind students that concurrent/dual enrollment courses meet the curricular expectations and are at the same depth and rigor of non-concurrent/dual enrollment postsecondary instruction. Instructors will provide students with a course syllabus outlining course requirements.
- 3. Students are informed that they should plan to study at least two to three hours outside of class for every hour they are in the class to be successful in college level courses. In addition, guidance counselors should inform parents that concurrent/dual enrollment courses become a part of a student's permanent college transcript and are calculated into the student's permanent postsecondary GPA.

H. The policies and procedures, if any, for determining exceptions to the required grade point averages on an individual student basis

There will be no exception made to the required grade point averages for academic or career concurrent/dual enrollment without prior approval by both GAI and the HS administration.

- 1. The registration policies for concurrent/dual enrollment courses as determined by the postsecondary institution.
- 2. Concurrent/dual enrollment students will follow the college's procedures for drop, withdrawal and petition policies.
- 3. The beginning and ending dates of courses offered during the regular day in the secondary school facilities will follow the secondary school schedule and

calendar. However, course registration, withdrawal and final grade submission dates will be held to the ERAU-GAI academic calendar.

I. Exceptions, if any, to the professional rules, guidelines, and expectations stated in the faculty or adjunct faculty handbook for the postsecondary institution

ERAU employees serving as concurrent/dual enrollment faculty in the GAI approved to teach college courses under this Agreement will annually attend a new faculty or adjunct orientation conducted by GAI where they will receive a copy of the Gaetz Faculty Guidebook, which includes the Web address of the Student Handbook, add/drop, withdrawal, and grading policies, as well as the ERAU Student Code of Conduct and critical dates. These instructors are expected to adhere to the professional guidelines, rules, and expectations presented in each handbook.

- J. Exceptions, if any, to the rules, guidelines, and expectations stated in the student handbook of the postsecondary institution which apply to faculty members
 - 1. The School Board shall annually assess the demand for concurrent/dual enrollment and provide that information to GAI for assistance in planning classes in the ERAU scheduling system.
 - 2. GAI shall be responsible for ensuring that the quality of instruction provided to concurrent/dual enrollment students is comparable to that afforded other ERAU students. To this end, the following will apply to concurrent/dual enrollment courses taught on secondary school campuses:
 - a. Concurrent/dual enrollment faculty shall be provided with a full-time ERAU faculty contact or liaison in the discipline they are teaching.
 - b. Concurrent/dual enrollment faculty shall be provided a copy of course plans, objectives and relevant ERAU Institutional Master Course Outline (MCO's). These objectives and outcomes must be included in the course syllabus.
 - c. The course syllabus must be provided to students and filed with the GAI discipline chairperson prior to the start of each term. Content of the syllabus must meet the same criteria as required for all college courses offered at ERAU.
 - d. Textbooks and instructional materials used in concurrent/dual enrollment courses must be the same or comparable with those used in courses taught on the ERAU Daytona Beach campus. If not identical, they must be approved by the discipline chairperson at the college.
 - e. For academic disciplines where a departmental exam is used, the final

exam will be provided to the concurrent/dual enrollment faculty by ERAU prior to the scheduled administration dates.

- 3. The secondary school administration will recommend qualified secondary school teachers as instructors for concurrent/dual enrollment courses. To be qualified, faculty selected to teach concurrent/dual enrollment classes must submit an adjunct application to their administrative contact at GAI ERAU, along with their postsecondary transcripts. The instructors must meet ERAU faculty credentialing requirements set by Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) Commission on Colleges' Principles of Accreditation: Foundations for Quality Enhancement, 2012 Edition (section 3.7.1).
- 4. In the absence of qualified secondary school instructors, ERAU may provide adjunct instructors to teach concurrent/dual enrollment courses on secondary school campuses.
- 5. GAI secondary school instructors who teach concurrent/dual enrollment courses will be evaluated by the secondary school administration using the district-wide evaluation instrument. These instructors shall also be observed for evaluative purposes by a GAI Regional Manager, or faculty liaison in accordance with GAI faculty evaluation processes. Secondary school faculty that instruct an ERAU course will follow the school board's guidelines for the performance of employees when evaluating these concurrent/dual enrollment instructors. Copies of Instructor performance evaluations will be maintained by the district and ERAU. This will include following the procedures for sharing and discussing the performance assessment tool/process with those being evaluated at least 20 days prior to the classroom observation;
 - a. scheduling the observation in advance;
 - b. providing a copy of the performance assessment to the instructor within ten (10) working days after the observation;
 - c. allowing the instructor to submit a written rebuttal to be placed with the assessment document in his/her personnel file housed in the Human Resource Office at ERAU;
 - d. and allowing the instructor the right to inspect, review, and copy the contents of his/her personnel file. Results of GAI's observation will be shared with the district administrator.
- 6. Concurrent/dual enrollment courses taught on a secondary school campus may not be combined with any non-college credit secondary school course.
- 7. As is appropriate for college-level study, course materials and class discussions may reflect topics not typically included in secondary courses that

- some parents may object to for "minors." Courses are not to be modified to accommodate variations in student age and/or maturity.
- 8. Any course-, discipline-, college-, or system-wide learning assessments required by the college in non-concurrent/dual enrollment sections of a course shall also be administered in all concurrent/dual enrollment sections of the course.
- 9. GAI shall analyze student performance in concurrent/dual enrollment course offerings on secondary school and college campuses to ensure that the level of preparation for future success is comparable with non-concurrent/dual enrollment college students. Analyses and recommendations shall be shared and reviewed with principals and school district administrators.
- 10. IMPORTANT: If a secondary school wants to offer 30 credits or more on their campus, they must submit a request to ERAU's Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs at least 9 months in advance. If approved by ERAU officials, the secondary school and school district administrators will work with college officials to create and submit a "substantive change" to SACS. Approval must be received from SACS before the additional courses on the secondary school campus may be advertised or offered.
- K. The responsibilities of the school district regarding the determination of student eligibility before participating in the concurrent/dual enrollment program and the monitoring of student performance while participating in the concurrent/dual enrollment program
 - 1. Student screening for eligibility and participation is the responsibility of the secondary school principals according to district and state requirements.
 - 2. The secondary school counselor shall identify those students qualified to participate in concurrent/dual enrollment classes on a semester basis and will verify their continued eligibility throughout their participation. This verification will be conducted after grades are posted each semester. The counselor will notify GAI's concurrent/dual enrollment officer when a student's eligibility status changes.
 - 3. The secondary school counselor will work with students to include concurrent/dual enrollment course plans to minimize enrollment in a random selection of ERAU-GAI courses.
 - 4. GAI instructors will provide academic advising services to concurrent/dual enrollment students, monitor their progress and attendance in concurrent/dual enrollment classes, and provide progress and attendance reports to their secondary school at the college mid-term and upon completion of the college term.

- 5. Students and their parents will be informed of college-level course expectations.
- 6. Students attending concurrent/dual enrollment classes held in secondary school facilities during regular school hours will be subject to the school district and FAA attendance policies when applicable. Required documentation of enrollment will be reported to the school district's MIS offices and ERAU Records office.
- 7. Students may enroll in courses conducted during school hours or extended school hours. However, if the student is projected to graduate from secondary school before the scheduled completion date of a post-secondary course, the students may not register for that course through concurrent/dual enrollment. The student may apply to ERAU and upon admission and special permission by the Office of Admissions, may register and pay the required tuition and fees.
- 8. CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT: Students taking concurrent/dual enrollment classes on their secondary school campus will be subject to their school district's code of conduct. If a student in secondary school class is found to have plagiarized any portion of his/her course work or assignments, the instructor will notify ERAU's Dean of Students and the student will be subject to the same disciplinary actions as other students taking courses on the ERAU campus, regardless of disciplinary action is taken by their school district. If a student is disruptive to the learning process through their classroom behavior so that the progress of other students or the efficient administration of the course is hindered, a student may lose the opportunity to participate in the concurrent/dual enrollment course, regardless of eligibility requirements for continued enrollment.
- 9. STUDENT RECORDS: The parties may provide personally identifiable student records to each other in the performance of this Agreement. Such records are provided pursuant to Section 1002.22(3)(d), Florida Statutes, and 20 U.S.C.A. 1232g Each party further agrees to comply with Section 1002.22, Florida Statutes, and 20 U.S.C.A. 1232 f, including but not limited to provisions related to confidentiality, access, consent, length of retention, and security of student records.
- L. The responsibilities of GAI regarding the transmission of student grades in concurrent/dual enrollment courses to the school district.
 - 1. Students with unsatisfactory progress reports should be counseled by the secondary school guidance counselor immediately upon receipt of grades from the instructor.

- 2. All students enrolled in concurrent/dual enrollment classes will be graded on the same basis as other college students in the same courses. GAI will assign letter grades to each student/course and the letter grade assigned shall be posted to the student's secondary school transcript by the school district. Instructors will submit grades to the student's secondary school and to ERAU.
- 3. If a concurrent/dual enrollment student earns an F grade in any course(s) during one semester he/she will no longer be eligible to participate in concurrent/dual enrollment. A student who earns a D grade will be permitted to retake that one course if offered, course may only be repeated once.

M. Accountability

This Agreement and the policies and allocation of responsibility shall be effective upon being signed by the representative authorized to commit the school districts and Gaetz Aerospace Institute of Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, but shall be executed before registration for the fall term of the following school year. Courses of study and programs are to be incorporated into the Agreement before instruction begins. This Agreement shall be valid for the 2022-2025 school year.

It is the responsibility of the high school dual enrollment specialist to notify ERAU's GAI Regional Managers or Education Director of all courses that the high school is requesting to offer. Each high school must complete the appropriate form for each course that the high school plans to offer. Based on need and faculty availability, ERAU will decide what courses can be offered on the high school campus.

It is the responsibility of the school administrative contact and instructor to verify their attendance rosters. ERAU instructors must check their online class rosters every day to ensure that the appropriate students are sitting in the class. If a student is not on the roster, the instructor should immediately notify the high school dual enrollment contact person. The high school dual enrollment contact person should notify ERAU's Student Services coordinator. Students not properly enrolled in ERAU dual enrollment courses will NOT receive college credit. Roster verification is the responsibility of the school administration.

N. E-Verify System

Pursuant to Fla. Stat. §448.095, Contractor agrees that it shall register with and use the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system, https://e-verify.uscis.gov/emp, to verify the work authorization status of all newly hired employees during the term of this contract or solicitation.

a) Pursuant to Fla. Stat. §448.095, if Contractor enters into a contract with a subcontractor(s) for the labor, supplies or services provided under this contract or solicitation, Contractor must require that the subcontractor(s) provide it with an affidavit stating that the subcontractor does not employ, contract with, or subcontract with an unauthorized alien. The Contractor

- understands that it must maintain a copy of such affidavit for the duration of the contract or solicitation.
- b) If School Board has a good faith belief that the Contractor has knowingly violated Fla. Stat. §448.09, School Board shall terminate the contract with the Contractor. The Contractor is liable for any additional costs incurred by the School Board as a result of a termination of this contract or solicitation pursuant to §448.095(2)(f).
- c) If School Board has a good faith belief that a subcontractor(s) has knowingly violated §448.095, but contractor has otherwise complied with this subsection, School Board shall promptly notify Contractor and order Contractor to immediately terminate the contract with the subcontractor(s).

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Attachment C Programmatic Information for School Based Administrators

As a Gaetz Aerospace Institute (GAI) Dual Enrollment (DE) and SMART@ER course member school, the MOU between GAI and YOUR school district includes the following requirements:

- ACADEMIC CALENDAR: Instructors and Students are held to the GAI
 academic calendar and deadlines, not those of the school district where grades and
 enrollment are concerned.
- 2. AUDITING GAI DE COURSES: Students are not allowed to audit GAI DE courses.
- 3. CONCURRENT CLASSES: GAI member schools are not permitted to comingle concurrent enrollment students this includes:
 - a. Dual Enrollment (DE) and SMART@ER or regular FLDOE high school classes cannot be taught be a single teacher at the same time with students that share the same classroom.
 - b. Where one of the classes concerned is a GAI SMART@ER class, multiple high school classes cannot be taught at the same time, by the same teacher, in the same classroom. This includes CTE classes.

4. ENROLLMENT:

- a. New dual enrollment students must complete the 1) Online Application, and
 2) The Consent Form prior to published deadlines. A failure to complete these processes by the deadline means removal from the class roster.
- b. All DE students must enroll in their courses online each semester prior to the published deadlines. A failure to complete these processes by the deadline means removal from the class roster.
- 5. ENROLLMENT MAXIMUM: The maximum number of students in any GAI affiliated class is 30. Any class that numbers more than 30 students must either:
 - a. Create an additional section to accommodate less than 30 students, or
 - b. Decrease the number of students to 30 or less.
- **6. ENROLLMENT MINIMUM:** The minimum number of students in any GAI affiliated class is:
 - a. For schools that have 1,800 or more students, the minimum number of students is 15. If a school wishes to enroll less than 15 students, then they must send a waiver request to the ACA Director via the Regional Manager and the GAI Scheduler.
 - b. For schools that have less than 1,800 students, the minimum number of students is 10. If a school wishes to enroll less than 10 students, then they

must send a waiver request to the ACA Director via the Regional Manager and the GAI Scheduler.

- 7. GAI EQUIPMENT: Within the MOU, "GAI Equipment" and "Equipment" within the GAI MOU with the school district does not include computers, computer hardware, and software.
- 8. ORDER OF COURSES: AS 120 (Principles of Aeronautics) and AS 121 (Private Pilot Ground school) must be taken in order.
 - a. Member schools can enroll students to take AS 121 AFTER AS 120 has been completed if the student so wishes.
 - b. Member schools CANNOT enroll students to take AS 120 after AS 121.
- SCHEDULE CHANGES: Changes in course, adding/deleting course sections
 must have administrative approval and provided in writing to ERAU prior to
 course commencing.
- 10. STUDENT CONDUCT AND BEHAVIOR: A student will lose the opportunity to participate in a course if the student is disruptive to the learning process such that the progress of other students or the efficient administration of the course is hindered. In addition, a student will be sanctioned accordingly if found to violate any of the ERAU student code of conduct standards.
- 11. STUDENT ENTRY REQUIREMENTS: Students must be in grades 10-12 for DE courses and have a minimum 2.5 unweighted GPA. Any exceptions must be requested in writing from the school administration stating just cause.

12. STUDENT ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE:

- a. Students who earn a "D" grade may retake that one class. Courses may only be repeated once.
- b. Students who earn an "F" grade in a course are no longer eligible to enroll in GAI courses.
- c. GAI students who withdraw two times are no longer eligible to participate in the program.

13. TESTING FEES:

- a. For GAI courses that include a certification test as part of the prescribed syllabus, GAI will pay the initial testing fees for the GAI student only.
 - i. Either GAI will prepay the testing fee to the vendor or they will reimburse the member school when invoiced (in one group invoice) for the testing fees that were outlaid by the school.
 - ii. Individual/personal student expenses for testing will not be reimbursed by GAI.

- iii. To be reimbursed, test receipts and testing scores from the testing entity must be submitted.
- b. For GAI courses that do not include a certification test for which the school and Instructor wish to test a GAI student:
 - i. A written request must be sent to GAI ahead of the testing date and a written agreement to reimburse the test must be received from GAI in order for GAI to reimburse the school for any testing monies outlaid.
 - ii. Individual/personal student expenses for testing will not be reimbursed by GAI.
 - iii. To be reimbursed, test receipts and passing test scores from the testing entity must be submitted. Failing scores will not be reimbursed.
